

Two Ways to Major in Economics: BA (Bachelor of Arts) and BS (Bachelor of Science)

1. *How do they compare? What is involved in each program?*

Note: Many courses have prerequisites. Plan your courses carefully.

2. *How do I declare a major or change from one program to the other?*

The online form for all choices of major and minor is on the Registrar's webpage. Changes can be made anytime.

Who should consider the BA?

Students who

- want to take a second major or more than one minor; this is easier to do with the BA.
- want to stop after one semester of calculus
- do not want to take ECON 3500 Econometrics
- are coming to the program "late" and need to fit all the classes into the amount of time remaining

3. *Who should consider the BS?*

Students who

- want more credits in Economics rather than a second major or more than one minor
- want to take additional calculus and linear algebra
- definitely want to take ECON 3500 Econometrics
- are beginning the program "early" and can comfortably complete all the requirements

4. *What if I want to pursue the BS but already took MATH 1212?*

Take MATH 1242 (Transitional Calculus), followed by MATH 2248 for the calculus sequence.

5. *What if I want to pursue the BS but Computer Science is really not relevant to my interests?*

You may petition the Economics Department Chair for a different set of ancillary courses from the natural sciences, mathematics or statistics that is relevant to your coursework in Economics.
