



Welcome to Vermont's Maple Conference Week

Sunday, December 6th - Friday, December 11th

University of Vermont Extension and Vermont Maple Sugar Makers' Association are pleased to host the 2020 Vermont Maple Conference Week. We continue to design conference sessions for anyone who wants to learn about maple production, whether you are an existing sugar maker, looking to become one, a forester you works with maple producers or a forest landowner looking to lease to a producer. Frequent attendees will certainly notice some changes this year (as you've probably experienced in most areas of your life since March).

Traditionally, January is the month for maple conferences. For many years UVM Extension and VMSMA have partnered to host two events while the Addison County Sugar Makers Association has hosted a third. Of course this year, the pandemic has turned everything upside down and gave us the opportunity to think creatively about how to offer meaningful interaction and education, even in one of the safest states in the country here in Vermont.

Like so many things right now we have had to make the tough decision to move the event online. Because the start of the season for some coincides with our usual January dates, we also chose to offer the conference in December this year (after the majority of the hunting season ends, naturally). We've set aside a whole week in December for Vermont's Maple Conference Week – kicking off with our popular Industry Panel and then offering three separate, interactive online sessions each day (morning, noon and evening). Our usual in-person welcome messages and updates will be recorded and throughout the week we'll offer "anytime" sessions on different topics for registrants to watch on their own time. Sessions will be focused around our usual tracks: Maple Business Management, Regulations and Maple, Sugarbush Health, Marketing and Media, and Maple Production and Innovation.

We acknowledge this format will be challenging for some in Vermont, where access to internet service can be inconsistent at best and where technology offers its challenges to each of us. However, this type of conference structure also has some advantages. It allows us to provide free registration this year, space out the conference over multiple days, easily record presentations for future viewing, and reach out to an audience and presenters well beyond our state's borders. We're excited for the upcoming sessions and the discussions they generate. We are also looking forward to feedback from participants about what worked and what could use improvement.

Good Flavor Factors


