

DIRECTOR'S NOTES



With this issue of On View, we welcome the new year and, with it, the Fleming Museum's 75th anniversary. Since 1931, the Fleming's exhibitions and collections have provided a gateway to the world's artistic and cultural traditions, and to an understanding of what art can contribute to our daily lives. The definition of art itself has expanded dramatically over the past 75 years, but from the first drawings on cave walls, artistic expression has reflected our hopes, dreams, fears, aspirations, celebrations, and revelations. The art that the Fleming Museum will present during the

course of its anniversary year reflects this vast range of emotional content, as well as cultural breadth, time span, and materials. This winter and early spring we spotlight art's exploration of the darker side of the human condition in two complementary exhibitions. Francisco Goya's renowned 1799 print series Los Caprichos presents an acerbic look at 18th-century Spanish society, through 80 prints expressing pathos, humor, and social criticism. At the same time, we present, in conjunction with the University of Vermont's Department of English, a collaborative project by former U.S. Poet Laureate Robert Pinsky and printmaker Michael Mazur focusing on The Inferno from Dante Alighieri's masterpiece, The Divine Comedy, written in the early 14th century. Also on view will be a selection of artists' books from the University of Vermont's Special Collections. Throughout the winter and spring we present an exciting line-up of programming that explores these historical and contemporary works of art from a rich mix of social, historical, literary, and artistic perspectives.

We hope you will join us in celebration throughout the year, as Vermont's leading museum of art and world cultures turns 75 years old. We look forward to seeing you!





NEW EXHIBITIONS

Francisco Goya: Los Caprichos FEBRUARY 16 - MAY 14, 2006

One of the most celebrated works in the history of Western art, Francisco Goya's Los Caprichos (1797-1799) comprises 80 captioned, black-andwhite prints satirizing the foibles of late 18th-century Spanish society. Goya (1746-1828), a renowned painter, draftsman, and printmaker, set out to examine the human condition and denounce the social abuses and superstitions that were prevalent in an era marked by social and political repression. Court artist to the Spanish royal family, Goya achieved recognition as an unparalleled painter of portraits and religious subjects. Later in his career, however, he began to offer a darker and decidedly more cynical view of his contemporaries, including those who had supported his work. Goya, influenced by Enlightenment thinking, envisioned the caustic commentary in Los Caprichos as providing an antidote to the abuses of the Spanish Inquisition, the Catholic Church, and the nobility, as well as

In 1993, Mazur was commissioned to create a suite of prints to accompany American Poet Laureate Robert Pinsky's acclaimed translation of this classic Italian poem, which transformed the traditional troubadour love song into a remarkable journey exploring the human condition. Mazur, one of America's most distinguished printmakers, defied conventions set forth in earlier illustrations by representing the passage through the circles of Hell from the viewpoints of Dante and Virgil. By placing the viewer in the midst, rather than on the outskirts, of Dante's narrative, Mazur's innovative prints offer an unprecedented probing of both the depths of human psychology and the ultimate faith in redemption. Many people are attracted to this art form because there is frequently an element of surprise as the book is opened, which continues as each page is turned. Artists are also drawn to the intimate nature of the book itself, wherein the reader/viewer experiences the work in a quiet and focused interaction.
